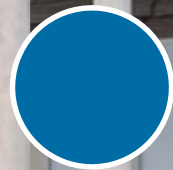

Green took centre stage

From deep botanical tones to mineral-inspired shades, darker greens created calm, grounded interiors that felt both luxurious and serene. From lush stone or fabric surfaces to deep-toned upholstery, green brought nature's calm into every layer of design.



Earthly elegance, rust to wine red

Earthy, warm tones such as rust, burnt orange, wine red, and ochre added warmth, elegance, and dramatic depth to modern living spaces.



Blue as the perfect accent

Not dominant, but essential. Deep blues popped as striking accents, creating a visual thread that tied entire colour stories together.

Tribal-inspired motifs

Geometric and heritage-rooted patterns told cultural stories, adding soul and identity to accessories and accents, panelling, and more.



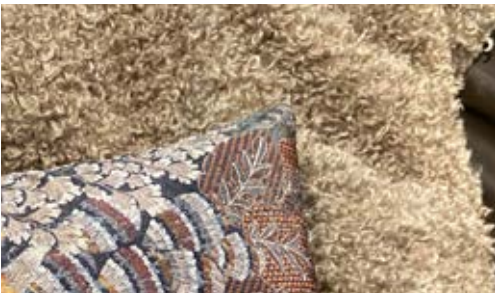
Floral upholstery

Avocado marble

Stone, especially avocado marble, was no longer used just as an accent, but as a primary design element. Rich in natural character and tone, the subtly green avocado marble, a Brazilian stone, gave a new organic elegance to modern surfaces.



Chestnut wood

Warm, classic, and full of texture — chestnut wood was the go-to material for designers looking to create contemporary silhouettes.



Misty and sculptural glass

Blurred, smoky finishes and artistic textures turned glass into something more - soft, luminous, and emotional.



Finish diversity

From high-gloss lacquered finishes to velvet-matte and fabric-inspired finishes, surfaces became a celebration of texture, tone and touch.

Sofas came with convertible seats, foldable leg rests, and intuitive levers - offering flexibility at every level.



Mechanised and modular

Electric headrests, footrests, and interchangeable armrests/legrests made seating systems truly customisable. While sensor-based mechanisms continued to be popular, we saw a revival of manual mechanisms – handing total control back to the user.



Split & island-style sofas

Sofas evolved into multi-directional zones - inviting relaxation, conversation, and everything in between.
